2007 Remembrance Plans

Root Vets, Families Remember Heroes

For the 24th consecutive year Beirut Veterans, families and friends will gather in Jacksonville, N.C. to remember the 270 servicemen killed in action in Beirut, Lebanon between 1982-84. The event also remembers 3 KIA's who died during action in Grenada in October 1983.

Each year, in the days surrounding October 23rd, hundreds gather in Remembrance and camaraderie. October 23rd has significance because, on that day in 1983, 241 of those heroes died in one terrorist act and hundreds more were wounded.

On that day, a terrorist truck bomb carrying explosives wrapped around compressed gas cylinders crashed into a barracks housing more than 400 service members. When the dust had settled, 220 Marines, 18 sailors and 3 soldiers were dead, and many more were wounded. For the Marines, it was the largest loss of life in a single day since Iwo Jima in WWII.

This year's event will feature a traditional candlelight vigil at 6 a.m. at the foot of the Beirut Memorial. The memorial bears the names of all those killed in Beirut and Grenada. Each name will be read aloud by veterans or family members. Each will, for a brief moment, live again as his name is spoken.

Later in the morning, about 10



a.m., a more formal ceremony at the Memorial will include military music, pageantry and commemorative comments from key military and community leaders. A wreath will be laid at the foot of the lone Marine statue who stands perpetual guard at the site.

Within eye sight of the Beirut Memorial is another memorial that shares a common bond. A piece of steel girder salvaged from the Twin Towers after Sept. 11, 2001 also stands under constant guard by the stony Marine statue. The girder was donated by members of the New York Fire Department who were also Marines.

Coordination Information

The Comfort Suites will be the preferred hotel for this year's Remembrance. The hotel is located on U.S. Highway 17 north (across the street from the Holiday Inn). Rooms are \$70 plus tax per night. opened at 8 p.m. Oct. 21 and 22nd for camaraderie.

In Search of a PAO BVA Seeks PR, Marketing Rep

This is a follow-up item from the 2006 annual meeting, where it was initially discussed.

"I think it would be a good idea to have someone focused on obtaining national attention to the upcoming 25th Remembrance," says Gaddo. "If we can start now we can use the 24th Remembrance as a launching point and have things in full gear for the 25th."

A primary focus of this volunteer position would be to develop national level media and other organizational contacts in order to shine a national spot light on the lessons learned in Beirut.

"Our BVA motto, 'The First Duty is to Remember,' should serve as a guide," Gaddo stressed. "We have a message that the country needs to hear."

The other focus for this volun-

teer would be to develop materials that can be used by BVA members to tell the BVA story in hometowns nationally.

"This could be in the form of flyers, three-fold brochures or news releases," Gaddo says. "Local BVA members could use these as collateral material to inform local populations either through media interviews, presentations to community groups or one person at a time."

While this is an unpaid, volunteer position, associated expenses such as printing would be considered for payment from the BVA treasury.

Gaddo emphasizes that he would like a person or persons with background in this sort of work. However, a motivated and capable person willing to learn can be equally effective.

<u>Author Plans New Book About Beirut</u> Looking for Input From Root Vets

The BVA Board of Directors approved support for an author planning a new book about Beirut.

Author Harold Wise is just starting a book about the U.S. military in Lebanon between the years 1982-84. His first book, "Inside the Danger Zone," will be published by the Naval Institute Press in Spring 2007. It is about the Persian Gulf war in 1987/88.

Wise plans to interview a large number of veterans and use them as the main sources for the book. His writing style features a strong oral history component using the personal stories of veterans woven into a historical narrative.

The author intends to be at the 24th Remembrance this year and would like to talk with Root Vets. He has obtained good oral histories from the Marine Historical Center as well.

Second Beirut Book Being Planned; Seeks Root Vets Input

Another author has approached BVA leadership with a request for support for a book he is planning.

Journalist Alasdair Soussi is planning a book that would be a comprehensive history of Lebanon, including American interventions. Soussi is of mixed Lebanese (father) and Scottish (mother) descent.

The 27-year old journalist specializes in North African/Middle Eastern affairs.

"I've covered many issues, ranging from street children in Cairo to Hezbollah in Sidon and Beirut," he wrote in a letter requesting support. "I've written for the Christian Science Monitor, the Toronto Star, BBC online and the Sunday Herald and Herald (Scotland's national newspapers), among many others."

The book, says Soussi, is intended to look at Lebanon as far back as possible (the Phoenicians, for example) and trace its journey (through the Ottoman Empire and the 20th and 21st century) to uncover why Lebanon is the way that it is today. Why does such a small country have so many religions? Where, in history, does Lebanon begin to collapse? And why?

<u>Beirut Stamp Initiative</u>

California Reporter Supports Issuance

On Oct. 23, 1983, some 241 Marines, sailors and soldiers were killed, and hundreds of others wounded or disabled, when a truck carrying the equivalent of 20,000 pounds of TNT was detonated on the ground floor of the Marine Battalion Landing Team 1/8 Headquarters' barracks in Beirut, Lebanon.

Other service members perished from sniper fire and other atrocities from 1982 to 1984, while still others died years later or are permanently disabled as the result of their wounds. In all, 270 Marines, sailors and soldiers died in that "peacekeeping" mission.

Beginning in 1986, a contingent of Gold Star mothers, wives, and family members of the 270 fallen heroes began a push to have a postage stamp issued to honor America's fallen heroes. This initial endeavor proved fruitless for the contingency.

In 1993, they gathered more than 20,000 signatures from American citizens, family members and comrades, and repeatedly over the last 14 years they have pushed for consideration of a stamp. They have been met with opposition and excuses - hundreds of reasons not to issue and honor the fallen and the peacekeepers with a commemorative postage stamp.

Some of the reasons for declining the stamp, as stated by the stamp committee, include:

- "We try hard to honor positive things."
- "People want non-controversial stamps."
- "Beirut lacked significance in American history, and not enough



people were killed."

Through the years, stamps have been issued in series and individually for Santa Claus, musicians, flowers, birds, politicians and love. The list is endless. I cannot understand how the U.S. Postal Service and the Citizens Stamp Advisory Committee can feel that these topics are worthy of providing a tribute stamp, while those Americans who were felled while serving in this peacekeeping mission are not equally worthy.

I am fully aware that there are stamps that honor many of the issues we hold sacred in the military and veterans community: Purple Heart, POW-MIA, military leaders, dedication of the Vietnam Memorial. Yet in my opinion, the years that it takes to get these approved to honor our military and our veterans - those who undergo the triumphs and tribulations in war and peacetime - has been excessively long, bogged down in red tape. And when a stamp finally is issued, it seems to be available for too short a period of time.

I support the Beirut Stamp Initiative and I strongly encourage the Citizens Stamp Advisory Committee

and the Postal Service to stop holding up issuance of this stamp. They also should issue stamps that honor our military men and women, their service and sacrifices, their heroism and pain, and make them more available throughout the year, especially during the months of May and November (Memorial Day and Veterans Day).

Let the postal customers decide what they want to put on their mail, remove those stamps that do not sell well during a trial run, and keep those that are in high demand.

We are fortunate to live in a country where the rights of others are treasured and protected by rules of codified law. In Beirut in 1983, and since that time, good men and women have stood ready to protect those laws and the people who live under them, including the people who decide who and what deserves a stamp.

The push is on to have the stamp commissioned on or before Oct. 23, 2008, which will be the 25th anniversary of the death of those brave and courageous Americans who did nothing more than come in peace.

Please join this national effort to secure the stamp and honor their memory.

BVA Board Chair Seeks Historic Root Vet Formation

To ALL Beirut Veterans who were in Beirut during the time frame of June –Nov. 1983 and were with or attached to the Marines of the 24th MAU, 24 MSSG, Air Wing, Charlie Battery, and any other unit not named here.

We are trying to set up a formation to take place at Camp Lejeune on the 22nd of October 2008. Since it will mark the 25 year Remembrance of the BLT 1/8 bombing in Beirut, we expect to have a very big turn out for the Remembrance Ceremony. There are two key reasons for this formation. First, it will help to bring all of us together at one place and at a dedicated time. By doing this it will help to make it easier to find old friends and buddies.

A second and the main reason is to have this formation in honor of the BLT 1/8 commander, Col. Larry Gerlach. As you know he never had the opportunity of being in or having a "Change of Command" ceremony for our BLT C.O. because of the injuries he sustained in Beirut.

I have spoken to Mrs. Gerlach and she feels he would appreciate this very much from his men. At this time we have decided to try to do this in secret without his knowledge of it. But if she feels it would be too hard on him, she may have to tell him of this beforehand.

What we are looking at doing is having a military type formation set up in sections or platoons. We would like to have each set up with its command in place (or as near it as possible) and ready to give an attendance report when asked to



"REPORT." At this time we are still working out the rest of the matters that will take place due to the fact that we don't know if this will still be a surprise for the Colonel. We are also including our MAU commander Col. Timothy Geraghty during the formation.

I want to make sure that each of you understands: this formation includes ALL who landed in Beirut from May to November 1983. BLT 1/8, MSSG, MAU, Air wing and any others.

To assist you can contact everyone you know who was there and have them send their email address to blt.18formation@vahoo.com so that we can contact them as this progresses and keep everyone informed. Or you can send in their email address if you like. We also need to know their name, and what section, group, platoon and company they were with. Example: BLT 1/8 Alpha com. 1st platoon. We are trying to compile a list of names for each. We hope by starting this now, this early, we will be able to reach as many of our brothers as possible and have a great turn out. If you will please forward this on to others that you know it

will help the effort. Exact location of the formation will be announced as a later date.

For those of you that have not given it much thought I hope you will consider going to the 2008 Remembrance in Jacksonville, N.C. Planning is already going on and we expect it to be a full 2, possible 3 day, event in October 2008. More details will be given out as plans are made.

Also for your information the Beirut Veterans of America organization (BVA) is going strong at more than 1,000 members. We send out this newsletter every quarter to keep members abreast of what is going on. If you happen to be reading this online and want to receive this newsletter go to www. beirutveterans.org. That is our web site and look around. You can also fill out a form and become a member

Also the BVA is in the process of compiling a members directory to be given out. It also needs each members' contact information. News Release Is Tool for Root Vets

The news release attached to this newsletter announces the 24th Remembrance of the Beirut and Grenada service. It is provided here in this reproducible form so that BVA veterans may make copies of it and disseminate it to their local news media sources. Also provided, below, are some tips about how to go about getting the Bei-

rut story published in local media. BVA veterans who wish to get the word out in this way are encouraged to begin providing this news release to media around the beginning of October.

Media Training 101: Getting the BVA Story Out

Talking with the news media can be a daunting task.

Some Beirut Vets may have a negative attitude about media, and in some cases that attitude might very well be justified. Anyone who has gotten burned by an inaccurate quote or a mishandling of information can be reluctant to talk with media.

However, the best way to get the BVA story out to the public is by way of the mass media. Whether it's print or electronic, that's how most people still generally get their day to day information.

There are definitely right and wrong ways of approaching media representatives. Following are some tips that can serve as a guideline for Root Vets to take their story to local media.

- ⇒ First determine which local media is military friendly. Who has editorials supporting the military? Who does frequent features on military activities. These are probably the local news outlets to visit first. Your chances of success will be greater.
- ⇒ Precede the visit with a phone call. Find the right person to talk with. Ask first for the mili-



tary editor or reporter. If there isn't one, ask for the features editor or writer. Set up an appointment to visit.

- ⇒ Be yourself. Don't try to be what you think a reporter expects to see. Just be cordial, calm and act naturally.
- ⇒ What do you tell them? Here's an example: "I'm Joe Vet and I want to provide you with this news release concerning a very important story about terrorism, the military and Beirut, Lebanon." Any news person worth their salt will want to know more. Tell them.
- ⇒ Only talk about things you know to be true and factual. Avoid speculation and don't talk about areas with which you aren't familiar. For example, if you were a radio operator in Beirut, don't talk about being a sniper, unless it is in general

- terms. Don't get caught up in the moment and try to be an expert in an area where you're not one
- ⇒ If a reporter asks a question to which you don't know the answer, but which is an important question, try to find the answer and get back with them.
- ⇒ Refresh your memory before you talk with a reporter. Read old news accounts or reference materials and bone up on the history of the U.S. Root experience. Take notes and don't be reluctant to take them with you.
- ⇒ Last, suggest the media get more firsthand knowledge by attending the 24th Remembrance. Emphasize that 2008 will be the 25th Remembrance and that they can get a head start on competition by getting to know the story this year.




